At one of our Peach State Meetings Ronnie Young led a discussion focused on Tennessee and Kentucky furniture. At the end of the meeting, I asked myself, what about Georgia Furniture? Was there anything of interest from here? I started by searching out and buying copies of exhibition catalogues that contained Georgia furniture. This acquainted me with the best regarded pieces shown from 1952 until the present day.

I then started researching various pieces of Georgia made period furniture. I've made use of the research recourses at multiple museums, MESDA, GMOA and the Old Governor's Mansion. I have been able to inspect and measure multiple examples of Georgia furniture, mostly focused on Piedmont region inlaid pieces. I've met some amazing decorative arts experts.

These activities enabled me to facilitate a Peach State Meeting for a special viewing of Georgia Furniture at the Georgia Museum of Art. I was also asked to speak at the 2022 Henry Green Symposium presenting my woodworking journey and a summary of my research to date. I am continuing my research shifting my focus to include some coastal pieces that have caught my interest.
