PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE AND RELEVANCE TO BOARD PARTICIPATION

I successfully worked 32 years as a professional educator and continue to work part time in education during my retirement. I taught mathematics and computer programming for nine years and after being promoted to administration, I worked 23 years as a junior high and high school principal. I also filled in as the acting superintendent for three school districts. During my last four years of fulltime work, I was a professor at The University of Akron teaching graduate students. As a building principal, I was the instructional leader, in charge of everything and everyone involved with the building. This included the hiring and firing of staff, curriculum, school publications, overseeing committees, establishing rules, school safety and discipline, and guidelines for the daily school operations. In my retirement, I continue to work part time teaching teachers how to make elementary students better behave while in school.

I believe that my professional experience has given me the needed skills to be successful on the SAPFM Board. With more than 30 years experience as an educated leader, decision maker, arbitrator, recruiter and communicator, I fit the bill of a Board Member. I also have the passion and desire for SAPFM to expand and grow.

WOODWORKING/FURNITURE BACKGROUND

My love of woodworking began back in 1967 with my seventh-grade woodshop class and has progressed into a thirty hour a week hobby. During the past twenty years, making Period Furniture has become a passion of mine. I live in a four-bedroom home and my desire is to furnish each bedroom in a separate Period style (William and Mary, Queen Anne, Chippendale, and Federal) with my reproduction furniture. My dining room, living room and parlor are all partially filled with my pieces. Such pieces include reproductions of a William and Mary Lowboy and Highboy, two Queen Anne Lowboys, six Queen Anne Chairs, a Queen Anne Flat Top Highboy, a Queen Anne Card Table, a Philadelphia Pie Crust Table, a Goddard Kneehole Desk, a Newport Chest of Drawers, a Boston Blockfront Chest of Drawers, several Candlestands, a Goddard 1764 Tea Table, and two Federal Card Tables to name a few. I have taken furniture making classes with Chuck Bender and Al Breed, both Cartouche winners, and finishing classes with John Coffee and Peter Gedrys. I have visited several art museums (Winterthur, Yale, Philadelphia, The Met and Cleveland) and historical homes to view and photograph their Period pieces. I regularly attend the Working Wood Conferences in Williamsburg and the SAPFM Mid-Year Conferences to obtain more knowledge and skills. I have been a member of SAPFM since the mid 2000's and I am an active member of the Ohio River Valley Chapter and an occasional attendee at the Great Lakes and Indiana Chapter meetings.

OTHER RELEVANT BACKGROUND/SKILLS/KNOWLEDGE

I am a member of the Official Board at my church, and I am the Educational Superintendent at said church. Two days a week, I serve as a prison minister at the Lorain Correctional Institution. In the past 14 years, I have been on eight mission trips (three to Ecuador and five to the Philippines).

I attended The University of Akron for twelve years to work on three college degrees (BA, MA, Ph.D.). I am highly skilled on today's major computer programs (Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Access, QuarkXPress, Illustrator, SketchUp and Photoshop) on both PC and Mac, and I am skilled as a writer and communicator.
